

# Vitellius

Augustus 69

Through the credible pen of the historian Suetonius we learn that Vitellius was a man who had very few redeeming qualities and were it not for the circumstances which brought him to the top of Roman society would likely have been no more than an ordinary shyster and thug lost to history. However, he had everything going for him from the beginning as his uncles were high-placed statesmen and his father a three-time consul and close associate of three former emperors. Spoiled through an easy life, he had

grown accustomed to getting his way by kissing butt and being shifty. At last Galba, who was by character absolutely the least likely guy to be won over by flattery, made him governor of Germany fully expecting the promotion to this far-off and dangerous outpost to be all but poetic punishment.



On arrival however Galba must have been sorry to hear that Vitellius was given a hero's welcome; not the least of reasons because he sought to ingratiate himself by caving in to every demand by the soldiers he was supposed to lead. As Galba's own popularity sank these same soldiers saw in Vitellius a vehicle to their escape from this forsaken frontier and a life of cushy luxury if they only contested Otho's usurpation. When the guard realized this conclusion over a hearty bonfire and lots of wine they went to go get Vitellius and dragged him right out of his home in his PJ's. They then celebrated as their next emperor and on the following morning all deserted their posts with the express purpose of leaving for Rome.

Vitellius, ever the pushover, caved in to their every demand and as they proceeded on their southwardly course felt no remorse whatever in sacking their own towns and engaged in all other kinds of inappropriate behavior. With the successful outcome of the engagement with Otho's forces, Vitellius was emboldened to do nothing loftier than throw a party and insult the memory of his erstwhile rival. When at last they arrived in Rome he disregarded all his imperial duties and felt but contempt for the Senate. He simply used his time to live a life of limitless luxury on public funds tainted with the additional blot to his credit of giving free reign to an ample appetite for cruelty so that during his typical day he concerned himself with little more than banqueting and putting people to death for entertainment.

News traveled fast and the armies under general Vespasian refused to swear loyalty to such an abominable figure. Instead they took the opportunity to name their leader Augustus with another civil war as an automatic consequence. But the conflict was hardly a bloodbath as Vespasian was seen as a liberator and had little trouble in simply swelling his ranks with wave after wave of dissenting legions who would have fought fiercely had it only been some man other than Vitellius. When Vitellius for his part heard of the momentum building against him he used every trick in the book to overcome the inevitable. At first he tried buying the support of the public whose welfare he had ignored for months by hastily putting together games and handing out gifts. When these failed to do much of anything he turned to the soldiers stationed in the city whom he offered money and the promise of early retirement should they prove capable of repelling the invaders. He even had the Vestal Virgins leave on a delegation to seek a truce with Vespasian. When this and similar desperate acts failed to curb the tide he sought no less than begging the Senate to allow him abdication with tears in his eyes. But, now the tables turning in their favor, they just mocked him and told him to man up and face the music. As the first of Vespasian's men then started pouring into Rome, a terrified Vitellius ran into a servant's room and blockaded the door with furniture. This, needless to say, only proved to the soldiers on the other side what a contemptible coward he was and once they fought their way in they dragged him out by the hair. He was paraded through the streets, pelted with obscenities (and worse) then tortured and thrown into the river like a common criminal.

While not cheap, the coins of Vitellius are readily available in all collectible grades. Expect to pay around \$100 for an "entry level" coin; say, a worn Denarius or As. A very nice Denarius may well go for \$500 or even \$1,000. As usual, well-preserved bronzes of this period tend to be very pricey.

A problem that is typical of the silver coins of Vitellius, as well as those of Otho, are the normally small flans they were struck on. Unless the coin was struck perfectly centered some of the legends will be missing. If they hadn't worn off already, that is! Naturally, those coins with full legends will command a premium.

The most commonly available coin for this emperor will be the Denarius of the Altar with dolphin and raven reverse.
